

FROM THE PASTOR

Lent begins this year on Wednesday, March 5, with an Ash Wednesday service at our church.

Smudging your forehead with ashes may seem like a strange ritual, especially for those who were raised Protestant, or with no religion at all. But even if ashes at the beginning of Lent is an regular part of your religious observance, you have probably had someone sometime (who is not familiar with this custom) look at you funny, and point out that you have something on your forehead that needs to be washed off. Still, Christians have been observing this ritual since before the Protestant Reformation, and lately more and more Protestants and evangelicals have been returning to the practice as well.


In Old Testament times people would wear sackcloth and cover themselves with ashes as a sign of repentance. In the book of Jonah, the king of Nineveh took off his robe, covered himself with sackcloth and sat in ashes, and called on his people to do the same, as a sign of "turning from their evil ways." (Jonah 3:6-

9). And even Jesus referred to ashes as a sign of repentance (Matt. 11:21).

But it wasn't until the beginning of the 11th century that the imposition of ashes became a yearly ritual for all believers, a reminder of our own mortality and sinfulness at the beginning of Lent. It is an optional rite, just as celebrating Christmas and Easter are not in the Bible and therefore not required. Still, many Christians find it is a helpful way to prepare ourselves to observe the holiest events in the life of the church: the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Ash Wednesday is a time for all of us to acknowledge our frailty and sin. We can stop trying to be something better than we actually are, and admit our flaws and failures before God. This is something we share with everyone present in the sanctuary. We are united in our sin and separation from God.

Ash Wednesday is also a time to face our mortality and remember that we too will die. During the service, those who wish may come forward and receive the sign of the cross on their foreheads. The person

imposing the ashes will say, "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." This is not meant to be morbid or depressing. It's simply a reminder of reality, and a challenge to make the most of our lives. When we remember that life on earth doesn't last forever, we can be grateful for the life we have now, and find new energy to live.

This year's Lenten Study starts today. We will read, pray and discuss our thoughts and experiences using the book <u>Practicing Our Faith</u>, edited by Dorothy Bass.
