FROM THE PASTOR


The gospel of Luke reports that when Jesus was crucified he prayed, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (23:34). How is it possible for someone not to know when they are doing wrong?

In his book No Future Without Forgiveness, Bishop Desmond Tutu asked that same question of members of the white establishment in South Africa under apartheid. How could they not know that they benefited from a system that impoverished, oppressed and disempowered a majority of the population? As Tutu pointed out, it's hard to criticize a system when you benefit from it. This does not excuse the exploitation, violence and torture that was committed to maintain the system of apartheid. But if you grow up in this system and have little direct contact with those who suffer, it may be easy to believe that the status quo is normal and acceptable. Most people see things only from their own perspective. And so many white South Africans managed to live their lives without

examining any of their assumptions of what was normal and acceptable.

Did the people who crucified Jesus know what they were doing? It's interesting that this verse, "Father forgive them..." is not found in all the ancient manuscripts of Luke. And the problem is, no one has the original manuscript. We just have copies of copies, so we don't know which version is closest to the original. Was there no verse 34 to start with, but someone added it? If so, why would someone want to add it? To make peace with the Jewish leaders or the Romans who were responsible for Jesus' death? Or, was verse 34 there originally and someone took it out? If so, why would anyone want to take it out? Was it too controversial to think that the people who killed Jesus might not have known what they were doing? And what would it mean if Jesus forgave even them?

The problem of verse 34 shows how divisive forgiveness can be. If we take that verse seriously as we seek to follow Jesus, we may have to forgive even people who torture and murder. But that doesn't mean

we shouldn't hold them responsible for the wrongs they have done.

Just last week a German court began the trial of a 93 year old former Nazi soldier, Oskar Gronig, who was stationed in Auschwitz in 1944 when 300,000 Hungarian Jews were gassed to death. He kept watch and collected money from the prisoners, but he claims he didn't participate in any crimes. Still, he was well aware that he was part of something that

was wrong. He said, "It is beyond question that I am morally complicit. This moral guilt I acknowledge here, before the victims, with regret and humility."* He asked for forgiveness and then said to the judge, "As concerns guilt before the law, you must decide."*

The prayer of confession we often say in church says, "We have gone along with evil, prejudice, warfare and greed." We may not have committed overt atrocities like torture and murder. But I don't know anyone who has gotten through life without somehow participating in evil, prejudice, warfare and greed, whether knowingly or unknowingly. Still, if Jesus really said about those who crucified him, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing," wouldn't he pray the same for us? And if we can be assured of God's pardon, it gives us confidence and courage to examine our lives and realize the ways we have participated in evil. Only then can we seek true change and reconciliation.
