FROM THE PASTOR

The world today is faced with the greatest refugee crisis since World War II. According to a recent UN report, there are close to 60 million people in the world who are either refugees, internally displaced, or seeking asylum. And the number is growing rapidly. How do we respond as people of faith?

Recently I read* about a gathering of people in South Carolina who were angry and anxious about refugees settling in their small town. They said they were afraid of Muslim extremists who they were sure would disrupt their way of life, even though most of the 32 people who have already been placed in the area are Christian. Still, one woman said, we are not a Muslim nation and we can't co-exist with Muslims. Another man questioned whether the refugees could be sent back to their home country. When he was told they could not, he became frustrated and asked, so, do we shoot them? The crowd responded with laughter and applause.

That's one reaction – fear,

distrust and rejection of people who are different, even families of the same religion in desperate need. But others, including pastors and church members, are responding with generosity and grace, welcoming newcomers into their communities, offering a cup of water, a sign of welcome, a helping hand.

Human beings have always been on the move, either seeking a better life, or seeking safety. God first began a covenant with Abraham by calling him and his wife Sarah to leave their country and go "to a land that I will show you." Then Abraham's descendants moved to Egypt to escape drought and poverty, and lived as foreigners there.

Generations later, Moses led the people out of slavery in Egypt to a new land. Even Jesus' family had to flee to another country to escape the ruthless and murderous King Herod. Our faith is based on stories of migration and deliverance to new lands of hope and blessing.

And we are not to forget where we came from. In Deuteronomy (26:5), when the Hebrew people offered their first fruits

first fruits to God, they were commanded to recite, "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor," and recount the story of their sojourn in Egypt and deliverance. They were also ordered to "love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt" (Deut. 10:19). And when the apostle Paul described marks of a true Christian, he included, "extend hospitality to strangers" (Rom. 12:13b).

SEPTEMBER SESSION MINUTES

The meeting location was changed to Elder J. Wilson's home due to the air conditioning being repaired in the Fireplace Room of the Church. The meeting opened at 7:35 with prayer.

Session **VOTED and APPROVED** the minutes of the July 14, 2015 monthly meeting and **VOTED and APPROVED** the minutes of the August 9, 2015 Congregational Meeting.

Mission & Stewardship—Elder S. Shanno reported that there were two groups of volunteers who worked over the summer at Habitat for Humanity in Paterson and Family Promise.

Property—Elder Topousis reported that the asbestos removal in the education building has been completed. Some of the church's indoor lighting has been changed to be more energy efficient. The Fireplace Room air conditioning unit was replaced. Elder P. Shanno is speaking with heating specialists about how to make the boiler operate more efficiently. Elder Peters will speaking with the architect to discuss moving along with the bathroom and kitchen renovations.

Worship—Elder Sophia reported that attendance in July was 212 and August was 241. Communion by intinction was held on July 9 and August 16. World Communion Sunday will be hosted by our church on October 4.

Asian Ministry—Elder Ito reported that English Conversation Class (Fall Semester) will start the week of September 28 and end the week of December 7. SMJ—Tsunami victim students enjoyed coming to this country and spending time attending camp. They appreciated their host families: Linda McGarry, Jonathan and Virginia Phillips and Susan and Kenneth Dindial. The students and host families are continuing to communicate by email. The Jazz Jam continues to thrive with guest players.

Budget and Finance: Procedure for finding new Treasurers. Rev. Given and Elder Voreacos will begin to look into hiring a payroll company and a bookkeeper to handle the church finances. The treasurers also recommend changing our accounting program and hiring a tech person to install and activate it. It was decided that this matter should be referred to the Budget Committee to investigate the cost and make recommendations. Elder Wilson made a motion that a bookkeeper be hired to handle the church finances. The motion was passed.


