


#### FROM THE PASTOR

As many of you know, Tom and I just returned from a two-week trip to Japan. Our first day in Tokyo we toured Aoyama Gakuin University, where Hikari and Junta Tani are students (They and their father Akihiro were baptized in our church back in 2001). The school began as a girl's school in the late 1800's, founded by a 23 year old American missionary. Today it is one of the most prestigious private schools with about 20.000 students from kindergarten through graduate school. They provide a liberal education and introduction to Christian faith for many students.

We also toured Doshisha University in Kyoto, another Christian school founded by a Japanese missionary, Joseph Hardy Neeshima. For hundreds of years, Japan was closed off to foreigners, and Christianity was suppressed by the government. But Neeshima managed to stow away on a ship to the United States as a teenager. He attended high school in Boston and was baptized. He went on to study at Amherst College and then

Andover Newton Seminary. In 1874 he was the first Japanese man to be ordained as a Protestant minister. When he returned to Japan. he helped establish the Doshisha English School which later became the University. Today we were told that while only about 3% of the college freshmen enter as Christians, about 20% identify as Christian by the time they graduate. We also noticed that in this Christian school, there were no crosses in the chapels. or anywhere on campus. We were told it was because the cross was associated with victory and domination. They prefer to use the crown of thorns as the symbol of their faith.

Less that 1% of the population of Japan is Christian. Most of the Protestant churches are small with many elderly members. We visited the largest Protestant church in Kyoto, the Marutamachi Church (U.C.C.) on October 25<sup>th</sup>. They are about the same size as our church, with a small Sunday School of 5 to 10 children. They were happy to welcome us, and we enjoyed conversations during lunch after worship.

They host an all-church lunch every Sunday and it is a good time for people to connect and build community.

Our second Sunday in Japan we visited a smaller church in Nagoya, the Nihan Kirisuto Kyodan. We stayed in an apartment owned by the church, with a friend of mine who has been living in Japan for the past 40 years. He introduced us to another side of Japan, inviting us to march in the Nagoya Gay Pride Continued on Page 2

Most of the Bible study participants do not attend any church, but are interested in learning more about Christianity. And we helped to convey the message of God's welcome to all.

Besides the universities and churches, we visited five different shrines and temples, three museums. two castles and one island, Miyajima. We were especially moved by the Peace Museum in Hiroshima which documented the horrendous effects of the atomic bomb. Japan is a beautiful country whose people have lived through much hardship and disaster. Still, they have a rich history and deep spirituality, and it was an honor to be able to visit and experience it for ourselves. Blessing,

## Korean Hand-Embroidery Exhibit

A month long exhibit of traditional Korean Hand Embroidery by Kumjoo Ahn will begin on Sunday November 15, 2015 at the Presbyterian Church in Leonia...

Bo-ja-gi dates from the Cho-Sen dynasty (1392-1910). in Korea. Traditional Korean hand embroidery is made by tiny needles and only by hand. Bojagi is not only the top of the textile art and the composite art but also expresses a prayer by women for their family and descendants to succeed, live long, be healthy, and be wealthy. These handembroidered works, using everyday humble itemssuch as thimbles, needle cushions and key rings, are regarded as important works which have the auspicious symbols directly related to securing one's good fortune.

The opening of Kumjoo Ahn's exhibit will be followed by a reception in the Fireplace Room after the morning Worship Service.

Kumjoo Ahn (K.J.) will also be conducting workshops. Dates will soon be announced. She has conducted workshops and lectured in New Zealand, Korea, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Malaysia and France.


### **DO YOU NEED HELP?**
