FROM THE PASTOR

There is much turmoil in the world as we approach the celebration of Christmas this year. We are bombarded with images of swarming refugees, desperately seeking to escape the widespread violence and terror in their home towns.

The people of Syria are living with two terrors: the Assad Regime and ISIS militias. Between the two, over 220,000 men, women and children have been killed in the last four years. Half the population is displaced within Syria, and over 4 million people have fled the country and are living as refugees in neighboring nations. This fall, our President agreed to settle 10,000 refugees from Syria here. But after the Paris attacks, more than half of our country's governors announced they would not welcome them. They cited security concerns, even though the US resettlement process is the most rigorous and discriminating in the

world.

At a time such as this, Christians should call to mind the entire story of Christmas, including the parts that are never read aloud on Christmas Eve.

According to the gospel of Matthew, after the Wise Men found Jesus and paid him homage, King Herod, in a brutal rampage, murdered all the baby boys in Bethlehem under the age of two (2:13-18). Bethlehem was filled with loud wailing and lamentation, mothers weeping for their children. and refusing to be consoled. The world doesn't change much, does it? But Mary and Joseph took Jesus in the middle of the night and fled to Egypt. And they stayed in that foreign country until they learned that Herod had died. Jesus began his life as a refugee seeking safety among strangers.

Not only was Jesus a refugee, a major theme of

of scripture is to care for refugees and strangers. Leviticus (19:33-34) says "When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt." Jesus invited people to

As Christians we are not to choose the path of fear. Yes, screen refugees carefully. But remember also God's way is to love our neighbor as ourselves. May we remember our neighbors this Christmas, and do what we can to welcome them.



Frozen turkeys, canned white potatoes & yams, boxed mashed potatoes cranberry sauce, pasta and pasta sauce, rice, pancake mix, syrup, 100% juice, canned fruit, cake mix and icing, coffee and tea, supermarket gift cards to purchase turkeys.

CFA always needs the following: canned meats and tuna, canned soups, canned vegetables, macaroni and cheese, peanut butter & jelly, cereal, dry milk and Parmalat, beans, rice, complete meals in a box, baby formula & diapers, ensure, and Supermarket Gift Cards, which allow people to purchase eggs, cheese and fresh products throughout the year.

The food we collect in the baskets also goes to Loaves and Fishes, a "soup kitchen" run by members of our church and other churches in our cluster. Loaves & Fishes needs canned vegetables, pasta, pasta sauce, canned potatoes, canned fruit. When shopping, remember to pick up extras and bring them with you on Sunday. Thank you.

At Christmas, we celebrate a great gift to us, and one of our responses is giving gifts to others. We have three distinct opportunities for such giving through our congregation:

Pledge Update



4.	Loaves and Fishes is sponsored by the Englewood, Leonia and Teaneck Cluster Churches and is located at Bethany Presbyterian Church in Englewood. They serve a weekly hot meal and send clien home with a light bag meal of a sandwich, fruit and snack.	nts \$
