REMEMBER AND DO

We began October with World Communion Sunday, with a robust service at Teaneck Presbyterian with our church and Bethany Presbyterian Church participating as well. In my sermon for that Sunday, I repeated Paul's words to Timothy: Remember, Recall. Rekindle and Remind.

As our church continues in this Interim year, we remembered and recalled last month at our church retreat stories of the church's past that helped to shape who you are today. We celebrated great ministry, both from former pastors and lay leaders. We noted decisions that shaped the mission of this congregation, such as the choice to use the parsonage as an emergency shelter for women and children facing abuse. We noted the arrival of immigrant communities and the impact they made in shaping and enriching the church. We noted when loved ones first came to the church as visitors or through baptism. We also lamented endings, including the departure of pastors, deaths of loved ones, and endings of signature programs like the Ecumenical Youth Group. We were honest about moments of disappointment, as well as hope.



You will soon hear more from the Session about how the church will move forward in rekindling the sense of mission for The Presbyterian Church in Leonia, and in its leadership.

October 23 begins the Stewardship season of our church. Our theme is "Go, Do!" which borrows from the theme of the Presbyterian Triennium Youth Conference Wanagwa Nyirongo and Mwai Makoko attended last summer. You will hear how our church will use your generosity to "Go, Do!" as we respond to God's call in mission, building community, discipleship of children and adults, and worship. But we could also add another element to the stewardship season, as we consider how God calls this church to "Go, Do!" into an open future. You know you already have great blessings of gifts in this congregation—I see them in your faces and in the service you do. I imagine whatever this church decides for its future in ministry, it is a future that God will be actively creating with you in loving partnership.

Cost: Conference Fee is \$200 for early registration; \$225 after March 25. Hotel Fee is \$125 per night at Doubletree per room if reserved early; rooms and costs can be shared. Conference includes 3 meals; other meals are out of pocket. Transportation can be by carpool, train or bus. Participants who are 30 and younger are eligible for denominational scholarships if they register early.

Schedule: Beginning with lively worship with music and keynote Friday evening, the conference will be full of workshops on Saturday-Sunday on themes related to peace and justice. You can choose your track or take workshops in varied areas, including Environmental Justice; Immigration; Domestic Issues; Nuclear Disarmament; Gender Justice; Child Welfare; Latin American Justice; Africa; Asia; Middle East and more! Plan to stay through 5 pm Monday because we will be scheduled to meet at our US Senators' and Representative's offices to lobby all day Monday. Presbyterian Church in Leonia Proposed Mission Trip Date: July 9-15, 2017.

Campbell Farm is a ministry of the PC(USA). They are located in Wapato, Washington, on the Yakima Indian Reservation.

Cost: About \$700 for registration, food at Campbell Farm, housing, service projects, and ground transportation. Participants must pay for meals and extra activities outside the Farm, and pay for and arrange their own airfare (about \$400). Betsy Voreacos will suggest several flights to Seattle within a 2-hour window so that we all arrive and depart generally at the same time and can share ground transportation.

Work: The Farm can accommodate different ages, including children. We would have some choice in our work according to our abilities. There is always need for handiwork and carpentry on the farm and in the homes of surrounding neighbors. There is also use for people to participate in feeding ministry, childcare, gardening and other farm activities.

Context: Wapato has about 95% living at or below the federal poverty rate. The area includes people who are all or part Native American (Yakima) and also Spanish speaking migrants who work the orchards. The Director, Carman Pimms, does a thoughtful job of teaching the layered history that has contributed to the problems of domestic violence and child abuse, addiction, and poverty that impacts most of the participants in the Farm's programs. It is likely we would be joined by another church doing a mission week.

Housing: Workers would stay at the Campbell Farm, and sleep in a house with shared dorm-style accommodations, with several bunks per room.

Spiritual Program: The Farm offers evening reflections where people share prayer and singing as stories are told about daily encounters. The week usually ends with Communion and a traditional native Smudging ritual.

Grab bars in bath areas (3 grab bar maximum per visit)


